



Arizona Public Law #1006

Prohibits the addition of Fluoride and Fluoride Compounds to All Arizona Water Systems

We, The Arizona Assembly(c), a member of The United States of America(c), unincorporated, with lawful superior concurrent general jurisdictions over land and soil, sea, and air in Arizona, hereby issue a Public Notice to all people, that it is declared and recorded by roll call vote, Arizona Public Law 1006.

Arizona Public Law 1006 demands that all fluoride and fluoride compounds are hereby prohibited from being added to any Arizona water system.

Potential human harmful effects of fluoride exposure include protein and collagen uptake, damage to bones, teeth, connective tissue, arteries, and skin. Research has shown fluoride causes irritability, anxiety, nervousness, difficulty breathing, abdominal cramps, diarrhea, constipation, stiffness and lack of mobility. Other possible side effects of fluoride exposure include cancer, autoimmune diseases, damages to DNA, tumors, and hypothyroidism.

Furthermore, all corporations and entities operating on our land soil are liable for any and all activities, and the consequences of those activities, that result in any physical, physiological, or psychological damage by depriving Americans our right to bountiful health as given by our Creator.

We, the People of Arizona, are not subject to legislation passed by our employees for the purpose of regulating their own operations.

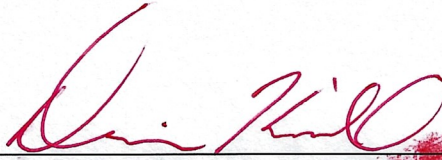

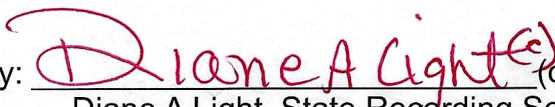
